To reduce those impacts and provide a better facility for the public, BCH members proposed the idea of constructing corrals to staff at the Medicine Wheel Ranger District office in Greybull.

BCH provided Northwest College welding students materials to prefabricate corral panels. The students were given the opportunity to practice their new skills and participate in a project that directly benefits forest visitors. BCH members spent six days hauling materials and assembling the corrals. Woodward Rental provided a skid steer and welding machine. Funding was also provided by the Wyoming Game Commissioner's tag.

"The new corrals will improve the experience for all trail-goers as well as protect the land," said Howard Sanders with the Shoshone Chapter of Backcountry Horseman. "We were happy to be a part of improving Bucking Mule Falls Trailhead, which connects people to Bucking Mule Falls Trail, a registered National Recreation Trail."

Shared Trail Safety & Etiquette

Fall is a great time to hit the trails and enjoy cooler weather and the changing colors of foliage. It's also the beginning of hunting season and the possibility of increased backcountry encounters with other trail users.

Bikers, Hikers and Horseback Riders:

- **Be aware** of your area hunting season dates, the types of game and what types of weapons are being used. Avoid peak hunting times, such as opening day, early mornings or late afternoons.
- Wear blaze orange for you and your horse.
- **Make yourself known** by talking, whistling, singing or wearing bells. You may scare off game, but it may safe you or your horse's life.

Hunters:

- **Be alert for trail users** and make your presence known to them. Recreational trail users may not be aware of hunting seasons, or that they are in or near areas open to hunting, and they may not be wearing blaze orange. Use appropriate caution and communicate openly.
- Always positively identify your target, and know that horses may resemble game at first sight.

All Trail Users (Hikers, Bikers, Horseback riders & OHV) should communicate, show courtesy, cooperation and yield the right of way.

- **Take time to listen** and **look**; be alert to wildlife and other backcountry users who may be nearby. Fall is also a likely time to encounter bears.
- When you encounter other hikers and trail users, offer a friendly "hello" or a simple head nod. This helps create a friendly atmosphere on the trail. If you approach another trail user from behind, announce yourself in a friendly, calm tone and let him/her know you want to pass.
- Yield the right of way: Bicycles yield to hikers & horses; hikers yield to horses; OHV yield to bicycles, hikers & horses.

SHARING OUR TRAILS A GUIDE TO TRAIL ETIQUETTE (fseprd553395.pdf (usda.gov) is a PDF provided by the FS and tread lightly [®] to help educate shared trail users in the backcountry.

This document gives guideline information regarding shared trail use by equestrians, hikers, bikers and OHV riders. Topics include preparedness, awareness, common courtesy, cooperation, and which users should yield to others.

All other trail users should yield to horses by first *stopping*, *speaking and moving to the downhill side* of the trail, if possible. Generally, horses move on first, but there are exceptions. Ask the horsemen how they would like to proceed for maximum safety for all.

Horsemen need to train their horses for trail encounters, be friendly and engage conversation with other users, giving them instructions as to the best way to proceed.

When people respect each other and work cooperatively to keep each other safe, trail sharing can and does work .

Enjoy the fall weather and our beautiful backcountry trails, be safe and follow good trail ethics!
